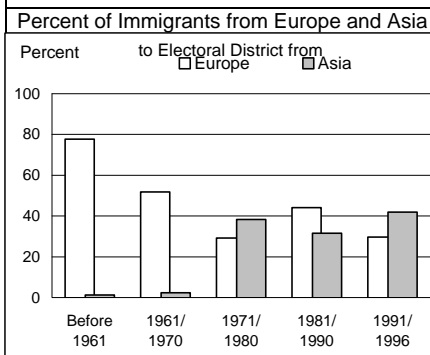

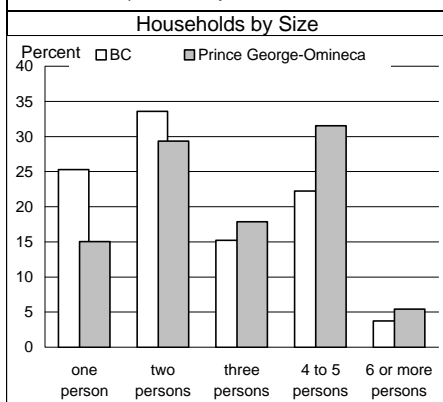

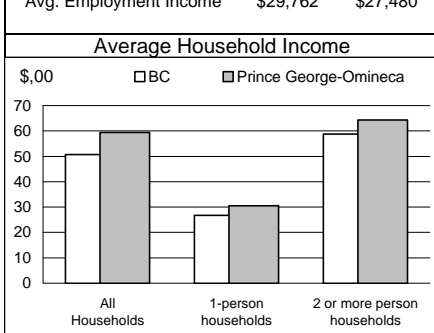

This report is derived by summing data for Federal Electoral District enumeration areas (FED EAs) that constitute the Provincial Electoral District. EAs crossing PED boundaries are judged to be in only one PED. Since data for a number of FED EAs is suppressed and data for all others is randomly rounded to preserve privacy of individuals, PED figures here will not match data published elsewhere that have been rounded after first aggregating unsuppressed and unrounded FED EA data.
