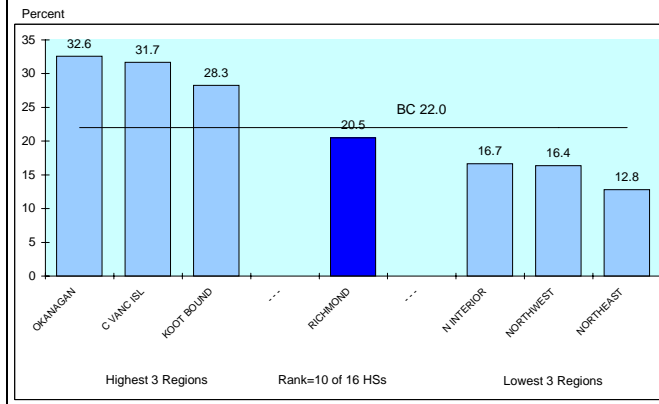

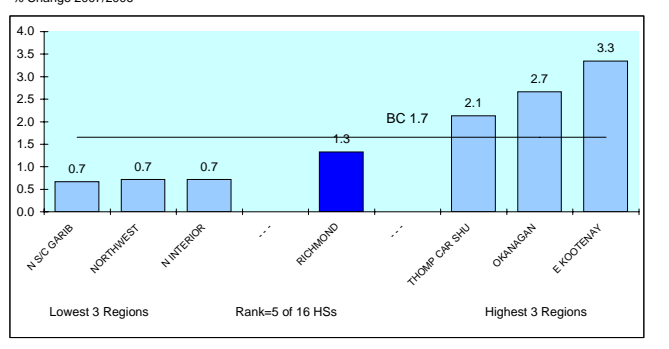
Elderly Dependency Rate - 2008

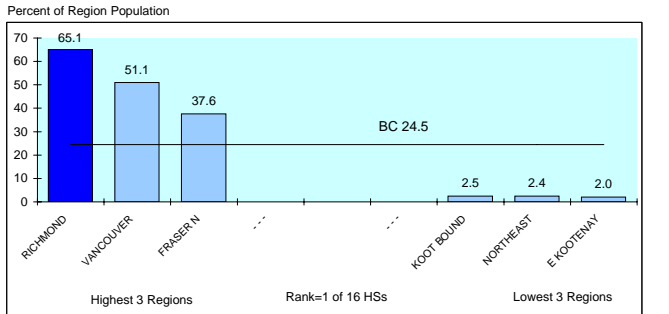

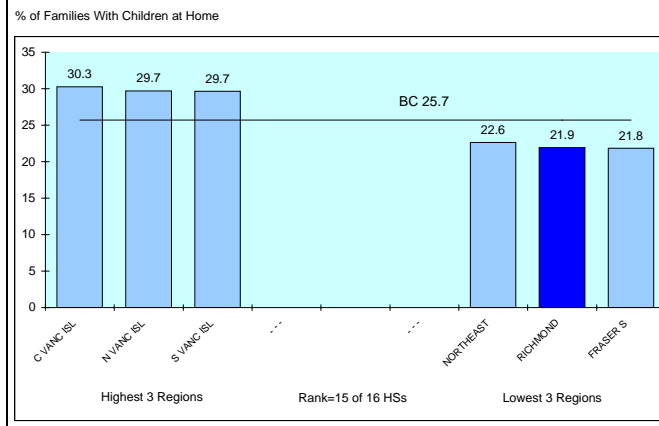
Visible Minority Population - 2006



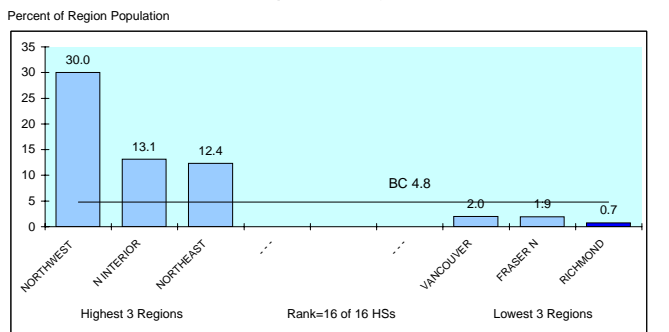

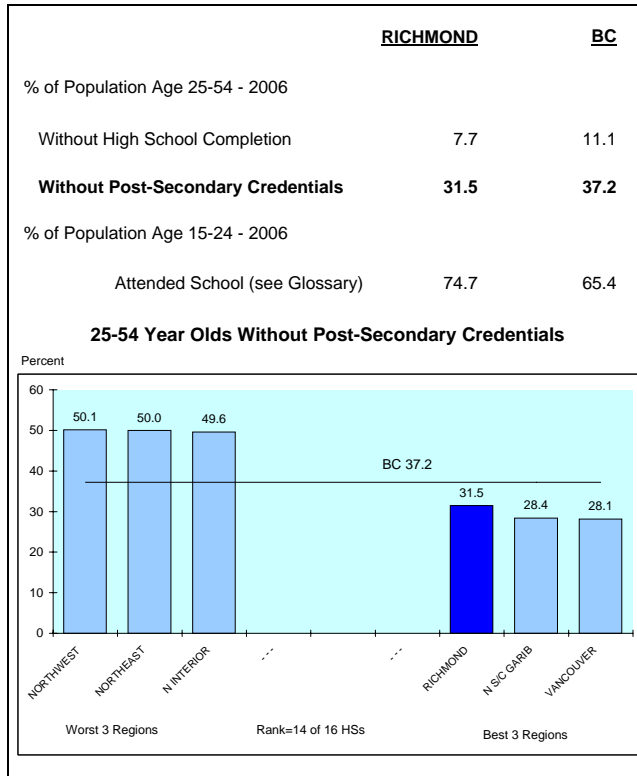

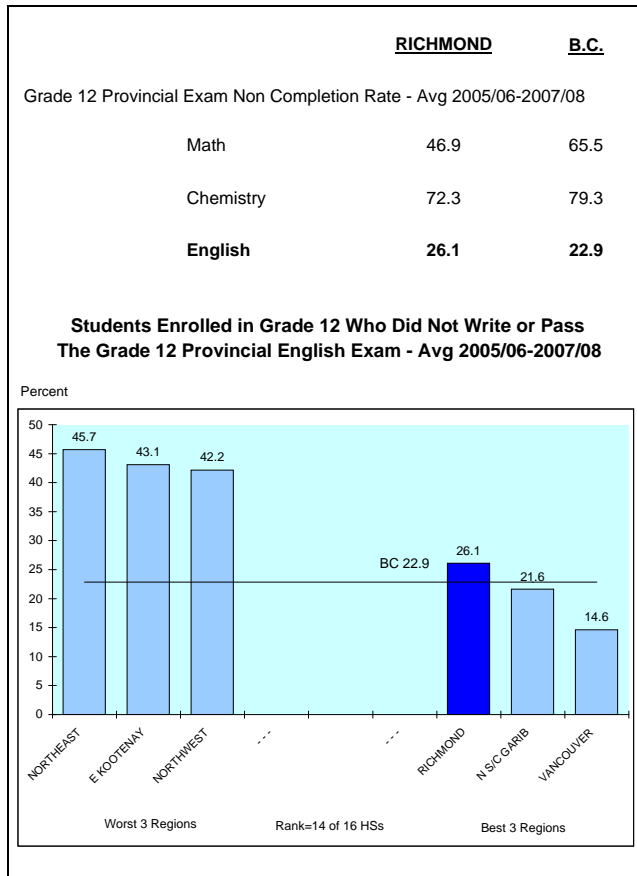

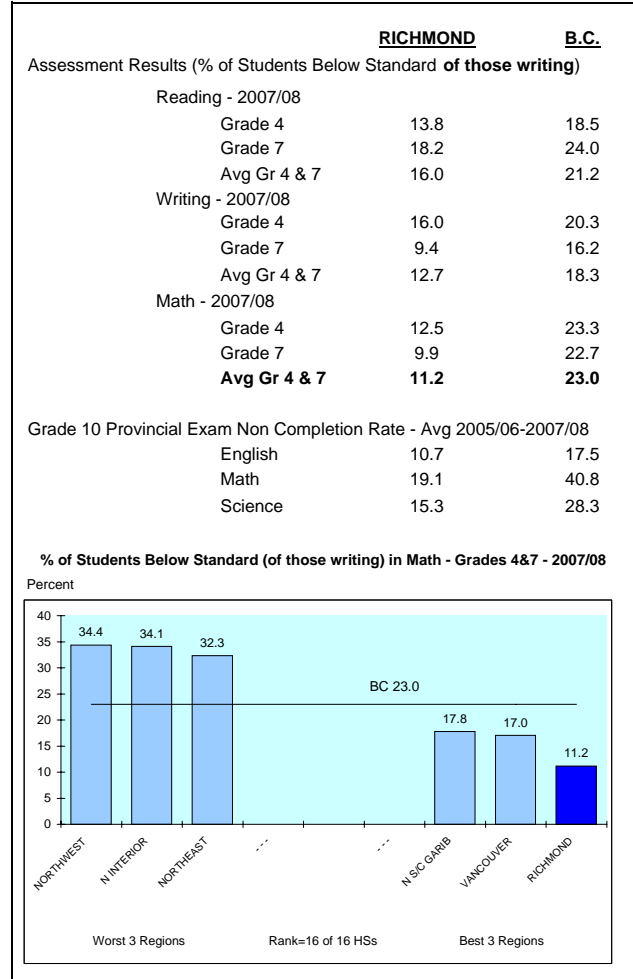

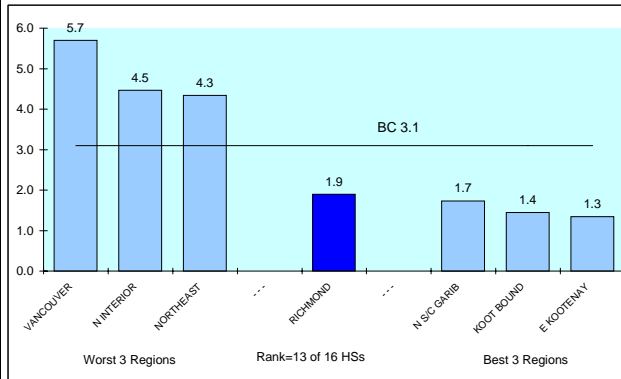

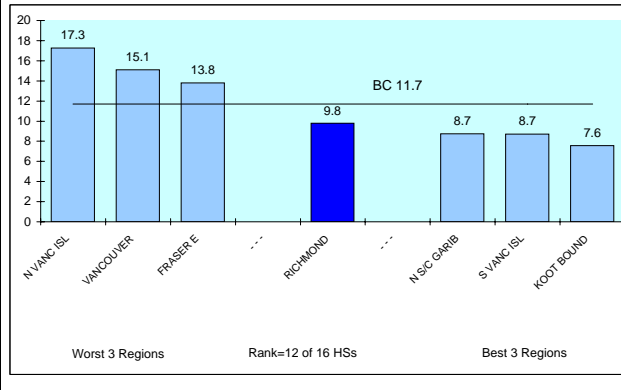
Serious Violent Crime Rate - 2004-2006

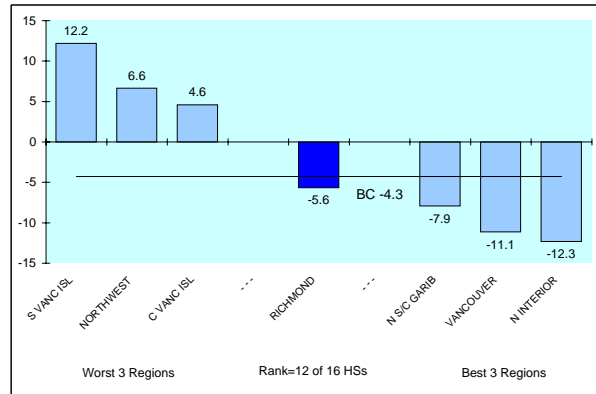

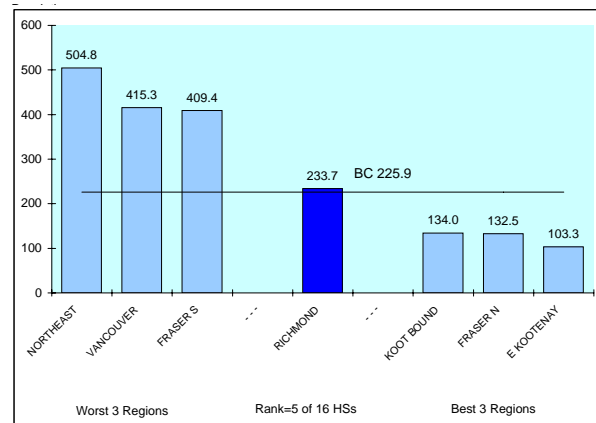

Non-Cannabis Drug Offences - Avg 2004-2006

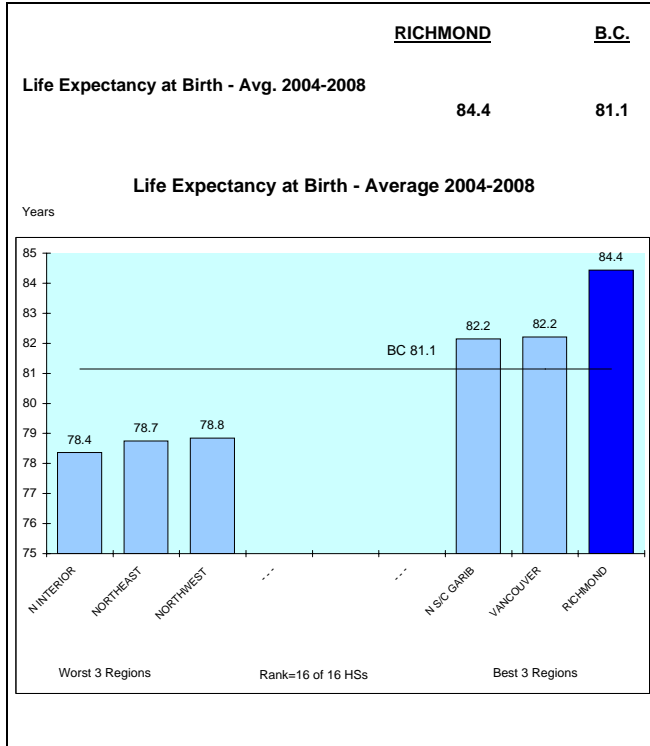

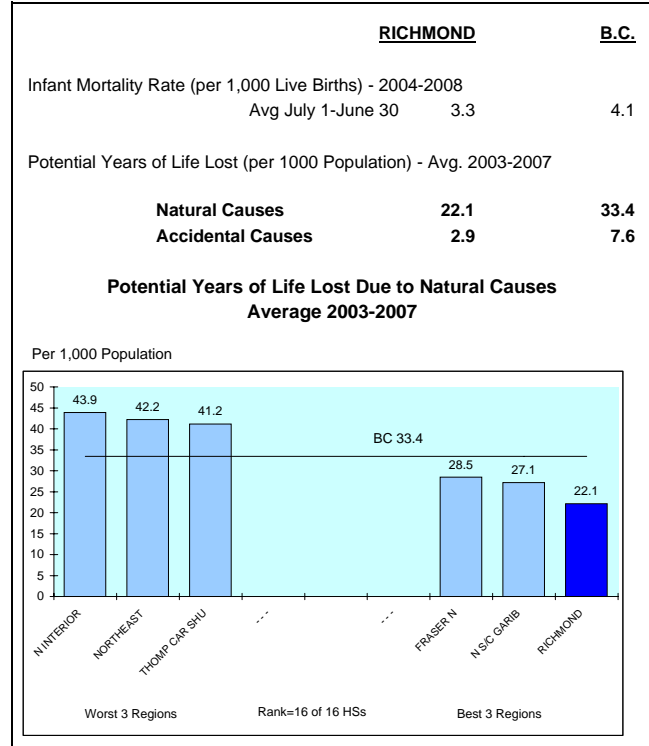

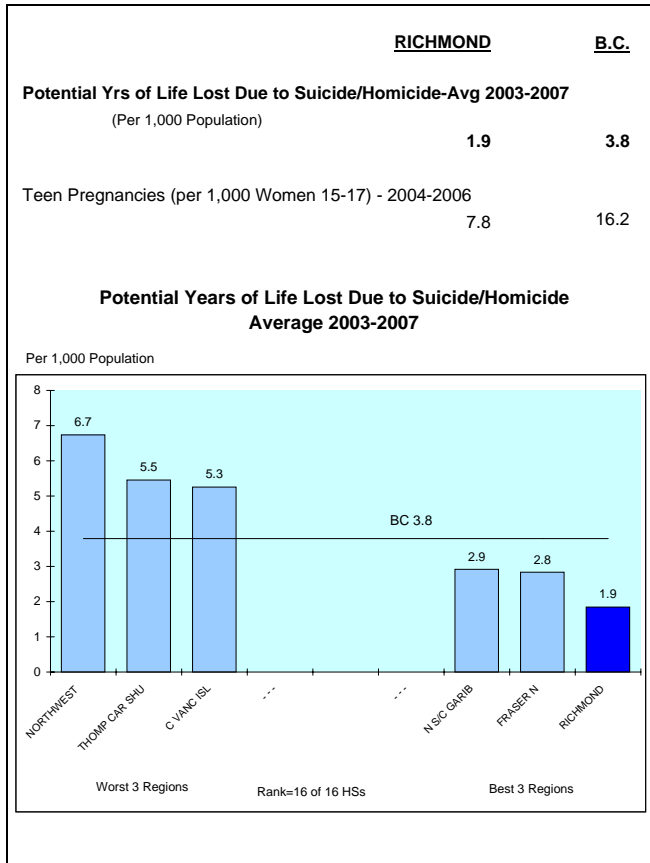

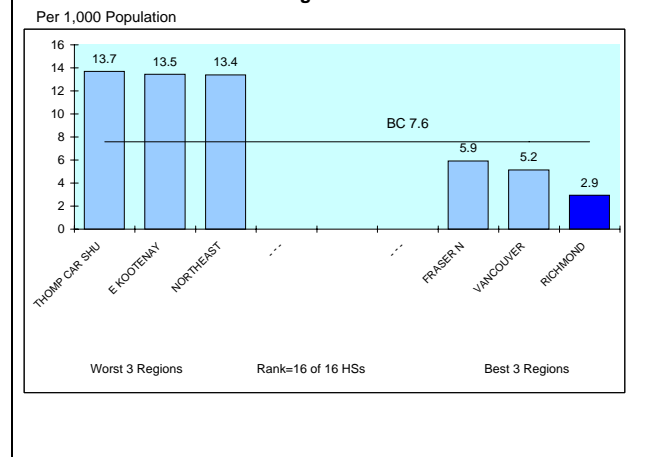

Potential Years of Life Lost Due to Accidental Causes Average 2003-2007



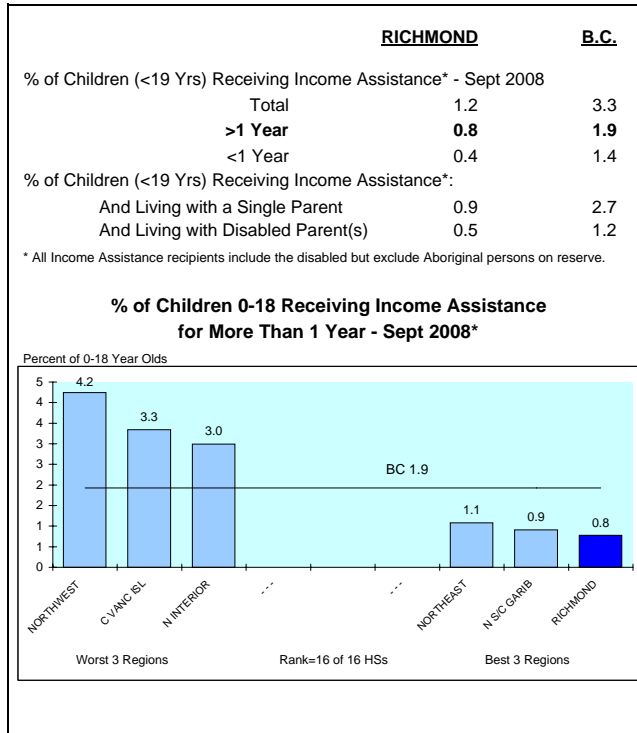

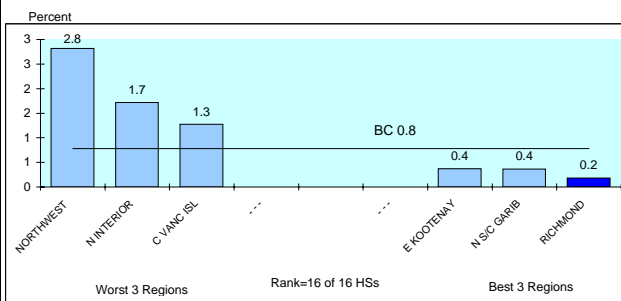

% of Youth 19-24 Receiving Income Assistance Who Are Employable

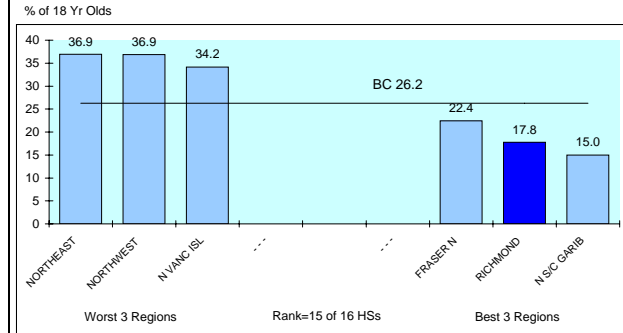

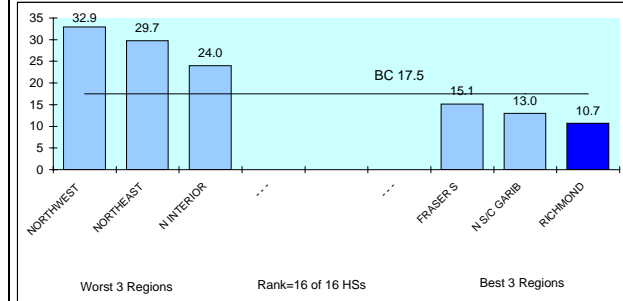

18 Year Olds Who Did Not Graduate - 2007/08



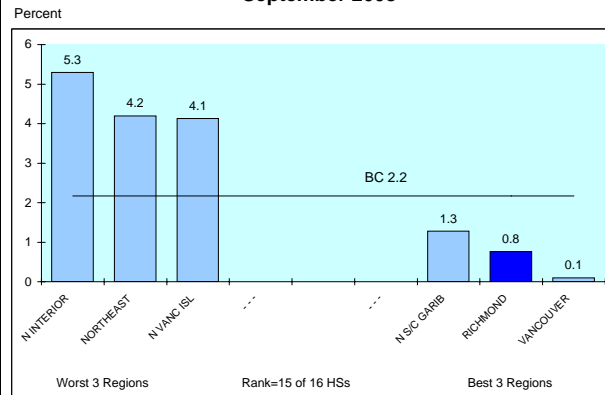
Gr. 10 Prov. Exam Non-Completion Rate - English - Avg 2005/06-2007/08
